UNIVERSITY FOR FOREIGNERS PERUGIA

The University for Foreigners Perugia is the oldest and most prestigious Italian institution involved in teaching and research activities as well as in the diffusion of the Italian language and civilisation in all expressions.

Its story began in 1921 when a lawyer by the name of Astorre Lupattelli, who had dedicated much of his life to the project, set up the first courses in high culture in his home town. His eventual aim was to heighten people's awareness of the central Italian region of Umbria - whose chief town is Perugia - both throughout Italy and abroad, to describe its history, its institutions and its natural and artistic history.

Until 1926 the courses were held in the University of Perugia itself, one of Italy's oldest and most celebrated universities, and in the Sala dei Notari inside the historic Palazzo dei Priori.

In 1927 the University for Foreigners moved to its own premises, the Palazzo Gallenga, another ancient building, situated in the center of the city. Today, along with the Palazzo Gallenga, the University also occupies four smaller buildings, the Prosciutti, Lupattelli, Orvieto and Valitutti buildings which, although they are set in the marvellous surrounding country side, are within walking distance of the main site. They form the center of a complex of buildings which enhances the teaching and research facilities available to the Institution. There is a further site, Villa La Colombella, an antique state-ly residence, which lies hidden in the green hills around the city.

It has, however, recently been renominated a University in its own right, consisting of a Faculty of Italian Language and Culture and Departments of Science of Language and Comparative Cultures. Besides Italian Language and Culture Courses the University carries out the following four Degree Courses (first and second level), which are open to foreigners and Italians:

- › Degree in Teaching of the Italian Language and Culture to Foreigners (ILIS)
- › Specialization Degree in Italian Culture and Language in Situations of Contact (LISCON)
- › Degree in the Promotion of the Italian Language and Culture throughout the World (PLIM)
- › Specialization Degree in Italian for Cultural and Enterprise Intermediation (ItICI)
- › Degree in Advertising Techniques (TEP)
- › Specialization Degree in Publicity Communication and Strategic Design
- › Degree in International Communication (COMINT)
- › Specialization Degree in Communication Systems and International Relations

Also including the one year Postgraduate courses (at first level) in Teaching Italian to non Native Speakers and in Radio-Programme Speaker, and also the one year Postgraduate course (at second level) in Internationalisation and Communications in Mediterranean Production Systems.

Admissions

First Level: for students with no previous knowledge of Italian.

Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Levels: An entrance exam is required for students enrolling for the first time.

Students having successfully passed examinations on the course attended are automatically admitted to the next level.

BASIC COURSES

Registration and Attendance

Basic Courses of First, Second, Third and Fourth Levels last three months. Basic Courses of Fifth Level last six months.

It is possible to register in any month of the year. Exams may be undertaken only after attendance (either continuous or cumulative month by month) equivalent to the length of the course.

In any case it is necessary to attend the last month of the Basic Course trimester (March, June, September, December) as these are the only months at the end of which exams are given.

BASIC COURSES

Examinations

All **Basic Language and Culture Courses** conclude with an examination.

The examination is not compulsory.

For admission to First, Second, Third and Fourth Level exams an attendance of three months over a period of three years is required, whereas to sit the Fifth Level exam an overall attendance of six months within three years is required.

Attendance records must be verified by course instructors in the individual student's study plan. The attainment of a formal Attendance Record is a prerequisite to exam applications. An attendance record judged insufficient by instructors disqualifies students from taking examinations.

Delay in enrolment and absences amounting to no more than ten days may be excused.

Exams are given at the end of each three month session and consist of written and/or oral tests.

Classes are suspended on examination days.

BASIC COURSES

Certificates and Diplomas

Successful passing of examinations qualify students for the following:

- › **Italian Language Certificate** showing final grade, for the **First, Second and Third Levels**;
- › **Italian Language and Culture Certificate** showing final grade, personal study course and grade average for the **Fourth Level course**;
- › **Italian Language and Culture Diploma** showing final grade, personal study course and grade average for the **Fifth Level course**.

On request, students who regularly attend courses but opt not to sit exams may obtain an **Attendance Certificate**.

Admissions

First Level: for students with no knowledge of Italian.

Admission to the **Second, Third, Fourth** and **Fifth Level** requires:

- a) an entrance exam for students enrolling for the first time;
- b) an end of term exam to pass on to the next level.

Students who attend the Special Courses for two months may automatically enroll in the third month of the Basic Courses of the same Level and sit the final exam.

Study programme

Classes and drill exercises of the Supplementary Courses at the First, Second and Third Level correspond to the Study Programme of the Basic Courses, with the same number of hours per week. Special Fourth and Fifth Level Courses are held only in the months of July, August and September.

INTENSIVE COURSES

Admissions

There are five levels of intensive Courses which last a month and are offered from July through September.

They include additional class hours per week and limited enrolment to ensure a small number of students in each class.

The enrolment procedure is the same as for the Basic Courses. Students attending regularly may obtain an **Attendance Certificate** on student's request, at the end of the course.

Regular attendance of two months qualifies students to enroll in the third month of the equivalent Basic Course level and to have the opportunity to sit the final exams.

SUPPLEMENTARY COURSES FOR STUDENTS OF EUROPEAN MOBILITY PROGRAMMES

Admissions - Course Schedule

These courses, which last a month, are for students of European mobility programmes (Socrates/Erasmus, Tempus...) and have three levels: elementary, intermediate and advanced. Enrolment of at least 15 students will be necessary to activate these courses. Should the number be less, the students will be directed into language and culture courses most suitable for their linguistic requirements.

The courses are intended to supply students with linguistic and communicative competence for a smooth introduction into the Italian academic world.

For admission to the courses it is necessary to present a document to certify belonging to one of the European mobility programmes. Students will undergo an entrance test to evaluate their linguistic ability.

The courses consist in 21 hours a week including:

- Italian language
- Language drill exercises and Italian culture
- Phonetic drill exercises in language lab
- Professional language courses (only for intermediate or advanced level)

Students attending regularly may obtain an Attendance Certificate on request, at the end of the course.

The calendar is the same as that of the supplementary monthly courses (see page 13).

COURSES IN THE STUDY OF ITALIAN VOCAL MUSIC

This course is reserved for opera singers, orchestra directors, set-designers, film directors and substitute directors and concentrates on the study of Italian Opera music scores. The students will have a piano and at the end of the course will be able to play in a concert open to the public. There are two lessons a week on a monthly basis which last the whole year of the courses in Italian language. All students regularly enrolled in courses of Italian Language and Culture have free access to this course.

SPECIAL INTEGRATIVE COURSES FOR CHINESE AND JAPANESE STUDENTS

These are a series of lessons given by native-speaker teachers in which the linguistic themes are approached with a contrastive method to give valid support to attendance of the Ordinary Courses. 4 hours a week at Elementary and Intermediate level. Chinese and Japanese students have free access.

ADVANCED AND REFRESHER COURSES

ENROLMENT PROCEDURE

On arrival at the University students should go to the **Student Advisory Office** with their **application forms**, where they will receive the necessary information to complete enrolment and to attend courses.

Within 8 days of arrival in Italy, students are requested to present themselves at the Police Office in the University for Foreigners for the purpose of obtaining an official **Permit of Stay**. This document is obligatory for anyone wishing to enroll in a University or any other Educational Institution in Italy, however brief the period of study.

- **Citizens of the European Community** must present themselves with a **passport** or an **identity card**.
- **Citizens from outside the European Community not needing a Visa because of studies** must present themselves with a **passport, four photographs, an official stamp and a health insurance valid in Italy** in order to obtain a **Permit of Stay**, which is valid for three months and is not extendable. Students intending to attend a course lasting longer than three months must request a Student Visa from the Italian Diplomatic Authorities in their country of origin, before arriving in Italy.
- **Citizens from outside the European Community needing an entry Visa to Italy** must be in possession of a **Study Visa** obtainable from the Italian Diplomatic Authorities in their country of origin. They must present themselves to the Police Office with a **valid passport, four photographs, and an official stamp and health insurance** recognized as valid by the Italian authorities.

Application fees will not be returned. Should authorization for some reason be denied by Italian authorities abroad, a refund – except for the sum of € 52,00 – may be obtained upon written request supplying all relevant documentation.

Students who have been awarded a scholarship from the University for Foreigners Perugia, the Italian Foreign Ministry or the Dante Alighieri Society pay a 50% reduced enrolment fee, to be paid upon arrival.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships to the University for Foreigners are available through the Italian Ministry for Foreign Affairs as well as other institutions, including the Dante Alighieri Society.

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs awards scholarships to citizens of countries where certain agreements are in force. They should apply to Italian Embassies, Consulates or Cultural Institutes for permission to attend courses at the University for Foreigners of Perugia. The University for Foreigners of Perugia awards scholarships to foreign citizens and to Italians resident abroad either directly or through Italian Cultural Institutes, giving preference to teachers and students of Italian in schools and universities abroad. The scholarships are for one month and contribute to living expenses and course fees.

Interested students should apply to the Italian Cultural Institutes of the country where they live.

Additional teacher-training course scholarships are available through competition for **Refresher Courses for Teachers of Italian abroad, Contemporary Italian Language, History of Art, Etruscan Studies and Italic Studies.**

Details regarding these competitions may be consulted at the University, on the University web-site, or abroad, at the Italian Institutes of Culture.
